Flight Safety Notification Dangerous Goods

Flight Safety Notifications (FSNs) are not mandatory in nature, but provide means such as guidance, methods, procedures and practices acceptable to the Authority for complying with regulations and other requirements in a systematic manner. These are not necessarily the only means of compliance. FSNs may also contain explanations of regulations, other guidance material, best practices or information useful to the aviation community. Unless incorporated into a regulation by reference, FSNs are not regulatory and do not create or change a regulatory requirement. A change of a regulatory requirement may come in the form of a Directive. A Flight Safety Notification is not a Directive.

Lithium-Ion Batteries Cargo Shipment Restrictions

Introduction

The International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO) adopted a new aviation safety measure which prohibits, on an interim basis, all shipments of Lithium-ion batteries as cargo on passenger aircraft. This became effective 01 April 2016. This interim prohibition will continue to be in force as separate work continues through ICAO on a new lithium battery packaging performance standard, currently expected by 2018.

Background

This ICAO Press Release came about as a result of extensive reviews undertaken by the ICAO Air Navigation Commission, and the UN agency's Dangerous Goods, Flight Operations and Airworthiness panels.

Action

All shipments of Lithium-ion batteries as cargo on passenger aircraft are prohibited. This does not pertain to those Lithium-ion batteries contained in personal electronic devices carried by passengers or crew. See the following for clarification:-

Passenger baggage:

- (1) Lithium-ion batteries carried by passengers in their personal electronic devices, whether in their carry-on or checked baggage, are <u>not affected</u> by this new restriction.
- (2) Passengers must not pack spare lithium-ion batteries in checked baggage. Spares must be packed in carry-on baggage or carried on the person.

Baggage shipped by air as cargo:

- (3) Lithium-ion batteries may no longer be packed in baggage shipped independently as cargo.
- (4) Lithium- ion batteries in mishandled baggage, or excess passenger baggage shipped as cargo, are permitted so long as they also satisfy the requirements of points 1 and 2 above.
